# Bushfire preparation checklist – outdoor jobs

Preparing your home and property for bushfires is a job best tackled before the fire season begins, says Jim Smith, volunteer firefighter and former Deputy Commissioner at Fire and Rescue NSW. With these printable lists, you can check off jobs to do around your home and property while time is on your side.

### If you live in a rural area

Ensure you have large, cleared paddocks around your home and valuable assets to stop or slow fire	If you have a swimming pool, tank or dam, put a Static Water Supply (SWS) sign at the entrance to your property
Replace combustible mulch with rock and pavers for landscaping around buildings	Check that you have adequate access to your property for fire trucks (of at least four metres
Check that firefighting equipment such as mobile tanks with pumps and hoses, fixed tanks, and petrol or diesel pumps and generators are all in working order	in width and height, with a turn-around area) Practise your animal emergency plan to build familiarity with steps such as getting in or out of a trailer
Clear all leaf litter from the roof, gutters and ground	Prepare a safe zone, such as a heavily grazed or ploughed paddock or a large, cleared
Apply fly screen mesh over vent holes to stop embers getting into roofs	stockyard, for animals that stay behind Mark or tag livestock for easy identification.
Check that you have enough hose length to reach all buildings and surrounding areas to extinguish spot fires caused by flying embers	

## If you live in a semi-rural area

Clear a space between the surrounding bush and your property, taking caution to ensure any felled vegetation doesn't damage the home, as this may impact your ability to make a home insurance claim. Check local planning regulations for clearing limits	Identify potential water sources for firefighters, including hydrants, water tanks, pools, dams and creeks, and put a Static Water Supply (SWS) sign at the entrance to your property Apply fly screen mesh over vent holes to stop embers getting into roofs
Ensure all lawns are kept mowed short Remove combustibles such as woodpiles, wooden outdoor furniture and mulch from around your home	Make sure there's adequate access to your property for fire trucks (of at least four metres in width and height, with a turn-around area).
Clear all ground litter and roof litter If you have a water source such as a tank or swimming pool, get a petrol- or diesel-powered pump to help put out small fires and ember attacks	

# Jim also recommends the following steps to make your home more resistant to bushfires (ensuring any changes meet your local building codes):

Enclose open areas under decks and floors where embers might fly in	Repair any gaps in external walls, other than those required by design, such as ventilation
Install metal gutter guards	or weep holes
Repair damaged or missing roof tiles	Install shutters made of fireproof sheeting over glass surfaces
Install fine metal mesh screens on windows and doors	Add fireproof insulation such as mineral wool or fibreglass
Install bi-fold mesh screens around balconies that can be opened or closed to reduce heat load during a bushfire	Consider adding external and internal sprinkler systems supplied by a large concrete water tank.
Fit seals around doors and windows to	

eliminate gaps

#### If you live in the suburbs

Clear gutters and roof of leaves and debris		Seal unintended gaps in the roof and external cladding
Trim back overhanging branches		
Keep lawns short and cleared of ground litter		Identify potential water sources for firefighters, including water tanks and swimming pools, and put a Static Water Supply (SWS) sign at the entrance to your property Make sure your pets are identified with a name tag or microchip.
Move combustibles such as wood piles, hanging baskets and wooden outdoor furniture away from your home		
Clear combustible mulch from garden beds close to your home		
Check that you have enough hose length to reach all corners of your block
